

along with exceptional photographs, so that a newbie can understand it. It also keeps more experienced sewers engaged. I'd recommend this book for everyone's collection, no matter their skill level, and it'd make a super gift for anyone in your life who likes to sew. This same author has a new book on sergers that I see will be out next month, and I can't wait! Just bought a new serger recently and it makes me feel like a total novice. I'm sure if that book is anywhere near the same quality of Charlene Phillips last two books, it'll never leave my sewing table. I still have her first book on presser feet within reach of my sewing machine for when I can't quite remember how to set up one for a task. Whenever there's a foot I don't recognize, it's so easy to grab her book and refresh my memory. I'd also recommend that book, because I've never met anyone who really knows what all their presser feet can accomplish, and they do make sewing so much easier.

This book is totally awesome. It walks you through the ins and out of the what's what in the beginner's world of sewing machines. But don't let that stop the more advanced sewing person. If you have had questions about needle to thread or needle to fabric this book will help you thru those questions. How about that tension question or how to sew on a fringe or maybe what foot to use then this is the book. I am very pleased with what the book shows and how it explains it. If you should purchase this book I would hope that you would find it as helpful as I have.

From what I've read so far, this is an extremely thorough book, for both the beginner sewers and even reinforcing information for experienced sewers. For the book, it deserves a higher rating then what I gave but I purchased the Kindle version of this book and I gave it a 3 star rating due to it's formatting on the Kindle app for iPad and PC. When you read this book using an app, it does NOT show the corresponding page numbers to the printed book, but instead it shows the location number. So the 160 pages for the printed book ends up being 3474 pages in the Kindle app. There is no way to find the actual book page when you're reading in the Kindle app for iPad or PC so when the author of the book tells you to refer back to a page # for more details, well good luck trying to figure where that is when reading the Kindle book through an app. Don't waste your time/energy and pay the few extra bucks to buy the printed book if you're going to be using the iPad/iPhone/Mac/PC Kindle apps.

I learned a lot by browsing through this book and I've been sewing for years. I gave it to my granddaughter who is just getting started on her "life of crime" with fabric, design and sewing and she loves it. Clearly written, beautifully illustrated, The Sewing Machine Classroom goes well
