

These Whitman books are great! It's not often that I find an older nickel but when I do, it has a designated slot to call home. In this case, the user must be smarter than the product! Yes, the backing of the slots is flimsy $\tilde{A} \notin \hat{A} \mid so$ just insert the coin into the slot while the book rests on a hard surface like a kitchen counter or desk. DO NOT try an insert a coin on carpet or another 'cushy' surface - it will puncture the backing! If used correctly, this book is the perfect way to keep your nickels organized!

I bought the entire collection of these folders that is available at the moment. They all arrived within a day of each other, as expected. New users may think they seem small but they are a very compact and inexpensive way to keep your coins organized. A great tool for the beginner or the experienced coin collector. Be sure to lay the binder on a flat, hard surface like a desk or kitchen counter when entering your coins and you should have no problems.

Well put together and at a decent price. This is what I used and my grandfather used when he was a kid. Whitman has been around for a long time and they do a good job. The reason I only 4 stared was because after a couple of times of removing a coin it doesn't keep it tight. Great product.

Always like whiteman's folder, yet something must go wrong in the Nickles one. The slot is not correct size, they are too small. (I don't know, maybe the Mints didn't published same size nickles? Because some of my nickles are fill, just perfect lock in as other whiteman's folder does; but some donot, the slot just too small) Anyway It still able to put the cons in, just need more pressure.

These books are great for small coins like pennys dimes nickels not big coins like halves! but i love this book i love trying to find certain years and seeing my book fill up! great for people just getting in to the hobby also if you have a kid buy him/her one and they will want to find the years so they will be using there brain and eyes instead of tv or video games! i love this product a lot!

The fit was a little tight for my liking, but that just comes with the territory. For the price you really can't beat the value of Whitman folders. There is a good reason why this company has been around as long as it has.

Glad that this folder has the snap-lock feature, because without it, the folder would be worthless. I have other Whitman folders for dimes and pennies (both older and newer versions) and they are perfect. For some reason, Whitman seems to have a tiny problem with the nickel folders. The slots for the coins just never seem deep enough for the nickels. If the coin could rest within the slot and be flush with the folder, I would be a little happier, but some of the slots are so shallow that the coin is slightly raised above the rim. Also, the rows alternate between 4 and 5 slots per line. The slots are so close together that pressure from inserting one coin causes the one next to it to pop out. I have an older nickel folder without the snap-lock feature and the holes are too shallow to hold all the coins, a few are falling out. I'm hoping that Whitman will improve the design for the nickel folders.

Quality construction. The Whitman folders are great for collecting coins. My only complaint is sometimes the holes are too tight, and it takes more effort to push the coin in. Not enough to make it difficult for an adult, but enough for make it hard for a small child.
